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

9-14 août 2023: XII International Congress of Mongolists, Ulaanbaatar

The XII International Congress of Mongolists is organized from August 9–14, 2023 in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia, held this year under the auspices of Khurelsukh Ukhnaa, President of Mongolia.

The Congresses of Mongolists have been organized in Mongolia since 1959. The twelfth forum will occur from 9–14 August 2023 in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia, with the accentuated theme of **“Pax Mongolica and Historical Experience”**.

The substantive work of the congress will be carried out in the following five sections:

- Section 1. Prehistory and History of Mongolia and the Mongols
- Section 2. Historical Development of Mongolian Language and Literature
- Section 3. Mongolian Society, Economy, Politics, and Legislation
- Section 4. The “Outside World” of the Mongols, Foreign Relations
- Section 5. Mongolian Culture: Tradition and Innovation

The accentuated theme “Pax Mongolica and Historical Experience” requires a vivid discussion from different aspects, including Mongolian history, tradition and customs, language, literature, social economy, politics, and the inside and outside world, special features of Mongolian nomadic culture and nomadic civilizations.

16-17 octobre 2023 : IV International Conference “Mongolia and the Mongols: Past and Present”

The Faculty of Oriental Studies of the University of Warsaw is hosting the 4th International Conference “Mongolia and the Mongols: Past and Present” on October, 16th-17th 2023 at the University of Warsaw, Poland. The conference is organized under the patronage of HE. Ambassador of Mongolia to Poland.

The conference will focus on the history, culture, religion, language, and art of the Mongols, as well as Mongolia's historical and current political, economic, and global relations, and explore the prospects for the future. The conference will be a platform for discussion on the role and present state of Mongolian studies and their further development.

The venue of the conference will be the Faculty of Oriental Studies, University of Warsaw, Tyniecka 15/17, Warsaw, Poland.

Humathèque : Dans l'atelier de Françoise Aubin, 13-30 juin 2023

L'Humathèque met à l'honneur le fonds d'archives de F. Aubin du 13 au 30 juin 2023: Les vitrines de l'espace détente, au 3e étage de l'Humathèque Condorcet, accueillent du 13 au 30 juin une sélection de documents provenant du fonds d'archive de Françoise Aubin. Ces vitrines, aménagées par Charlotte Corinaldi du service des archives, sont notamment présentées en écho à l'exposition "De près de loin : regards situés sur les musulmans du nord-ouest chinois", visible dans l'Interface au rez-de-chaussée de l'Humathèque.

Françoise Aubin (1932-2017) était historienne et anthropologue orientaliste rattachée au CNRS. Ce fonds d'archives ainsi qu'une partie de la bibliothèque de la chercheuse ont rejoint le Centre d'études mongoles et sibériennes (EPHE) en 2017, et sont désormais conservés à l'Humathèque. Ces vitrines se veulent une plongée dans les pratiques de recherche d'une chercheuse à la carrière singulière, partageant ainsi les réflexions autour du classement prochain du fonds qui a été récolté en fin d'année 2022 (description sommaire du contenu des cartons).



Hedwig A. Waters, *Moral Economic Transition on the Mongolian Borderland. A proportional share*, UCL Press, 2023

Since the early 1990s, Mongolia began its hopeful transition from socialism to a market democracy, becoming increasingly dependent on international mining revenue. Both shifts were promised to herald a new age of economic plenty for all. Now, roughly 30 years on, many of Mongolia's poor and rural feel that they have been forgotten.

Moral Economic Transitions in the Mongolian Borderlands describes these shifts from the viewpoint of the self-proclaimed 'excluded': the rural township of Magtaal on the Chinese border. In the wake of socialism, the population of this resource-rich area found itself without employment and state institutions, yet surrounded by lush nature 30 kilometres from the voracious Chinese market. A two-tiered resource-extractive political-economic system developed. Whilst large-scale, formal, legally sanctioned conglomerates arrived to extract oil and land for international profits, the local residents grew increasingly dependent on the Chinese-funded informal, illegal cross-border wildlife trade. More than a story about rampant capitalist extraction in the resource frontier, this book intimately details the complex inner worlds, moral ambiguities and emergent collective politics constructed by individuals who feel caught in political-economic shifts largely outside of their control.

Offering much needed nuance to commonplace descriptions of Mongolia's post-socialist transition, this study presents rich ethnographic detail through the eyes and voices of the state's

most geographically marginalized. It is of interest not only to experts of political-economy and post-socialist transition, but also to non-academic readers intrigued by the interplay of value(s) and capitalism.
