Art and Art History in/of Mongolia: Past and present

Nyam-Osoryn Tsultem, Mongolia's Labor Hero, People's Artist, State Prize recipient, and Honored Art Worker of Mongolia, was not only a prolific artist who produced many treasures of Mongolian art. He was also the first art historian who received his doctoral degree in art history in 1971. His activities that spanned over sixty years of his life were dedicated to the development of fine art institution in Mongolia, founding a Museum of Fine Arts, establishing the Fine Art School as an independent college, and leading the Union of Mongolian Artists into a prosperous institution. This conference is to discuss Tsultem's contribution to Mongolian art and art history through historical and theoretical lens as well as to discuss the past and current state of art-historical research of Mongolian arts by identifying research areas, themes and new topics, methodologies, and future prospects.

The first day of this Conference - Wednesday, January 8 - will take place at the Gulbenkian Foundation; after the Opening Session, it will be entirely dedicated to discuss the EU relations with the Caucasus and Central Asia countries: Bilateral and Multilateral Partnerships, Cooperation Agreements, Geopolitical Issues... 

China today positions itself as a model of state-led environmentalism. On the country's arid rangelands, grassland conservation policies have targeted pastoralists and their animals, blamed for causing desertification. State environmentalism—in the form of grazing bans, enclosure, and resettlement—has transformed the lives of many ethnic minority herders in China's western borderlands.

However, this book shows how such policies have been contested and negotiated on the ground, in the context of the state's intensifying nation-building project. Drawing on ethnographic fieldwork in Alasha, in the far west of China's Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region, Thomas White describes how ethnic Mongols have foregrounded the local breed of Bactrian camel, mobilizing ideas of heritage and resource conservation to defend pastoralism.

In exploring how the greening of the Chinese state affects the entangled lives of humans and animals at the margins of the nation-state, this study is both a political biography of the Bactrian camel and an innovative work of political ecology addressing critical questions of rural livelihoods, conservation, and state power.

The cultural, historical and religious ties binding Tibet, Mongolia and the Dalai Lama dates back to the time of Genghis Khan in the 13th century. Tibetan and the descendants of Genghis Khan developed a unique relationship of "Cho-yon", priest-patron, where the Mongol's military power protected Tibet from internal and external attacks and the Tibetan Lamas gave the Mongol chiefs moral and spiritual legitimacy to rule. The Mongol ruler Altan Khan gave the title Dalai (meaning "ocean of wisdom") to Sonam Gyatso, the third Dalai Lama, in 1577.
